We are pleased to report that in 2019 the City of Pharr's committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balance is \$21.0 million and is equal to 164 days of operating expenditures. We will continue a conservative approach to budget management to maximize resources in the upcoming year.

In this report, we have also included statistical information for the City as well as contact information for Board Members and City departments.

We appreciate your interest in the City of Pharr's government and how it functions, and we welcome your feedback, suggestions, and comments regarding the information contained in this report.



The PAFR is a summary of the major financial activities of the City's Governmental and Enterprise funds and does not include component unit and non-major fund data.* The information in this report was drawn from information found in the audited 2019 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) of the City of Pharr, which can be found on the City's website. The CAFR report is prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and includes financial statements audited by Oscar R. Gonzalez, C.P.A. & Associates, P.L.L.C.

The financial information presented in this report is summarized and does not substitute for the City's CAFR. By its nature, this report is unaudited and presented on a non-GAAP basis.

ABOUT THE CITY OF PHARR

The City of Pharr was founded in 1909 and has an estimated population of 79,707 as of September 30, 2019. The City boasts of the largest International Bridge in the world and is the gateway to Latin America along U.S. 281. In 2006 the City was awarded the title of All America City.

The City utilizes a City Manager form of government. The City Manager, who is appointed by the Board of Commissioners, is held responsible for the execution of the laws and the administration of the government of the City.

The Board of Commissioners consists of a Mayor and six (6) commissioners, whom are elected by the City at large for a term of four (4) years. The Board of Commissioners enacts local legislation, adopts budgets, and determines policies. All powers of the City are exercised in the manner prescribed by the City Charter, or if the manner be not prescribed, then in such manner as may be prescribed by ordinance, the State Constitution, or by the statues of the State of Texas.

WHERE GENERAL FUND MONEY COMES FROM

The City must raise funds to pay for the services that it provides to the citizens and businesses. The sources of funds, known as revenues, are raised through taxes, grants, and charges.

GOVERNMENTAL REVENUES


It is important to analyze the City's General fund when assessing the financial results of the City. The General fund is the general operating fund of the City and supports the day-to-day operations of the City, therefore our main focus will be the General Fund. This fund is used to account for all financial resources traditionally associated with government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Total revenues of the governmental funds increased by \$1,785,875.

The graph on the right illustrates governmental revenues by source. Property taxes (39%) and Sales tax (36%) are the largest sources of funds followed by Fees and Charges (12%).



WHERE GENERAL FUND MONEY GOES

The money the City collects from all sources must be spent efficiently to provide services to the citizens and businesses of the City. The General fund finances the day-to-day operations of the City. General fund expenditures are categorized by the type of service provided. The different categories are General Government, Public Safety, Highways and Streets, Health and Welfare, and Culture and Recreation.

The City expensed \$823,280 more than it did last year. This was mainly due to higher general government and public safety expenditures consisting of equipment purchases, and other operating supplies.



The graph on the right illustrates the General fund expenditures by function. Public Safety (47%) is the largest use of funds followed by General government (25%), Culture and Recreation (13%), and Highway and Streets (9%).



The City's general fund spent more money that it brought in. This is because the City used excess bridge funds to cover expenses as budgeted. This amount excludes data from Component units and Non-major governmental funds and transfer in and out from/to other funds.

SALES TAX

Sales tax revenue collected by the city is 2% of the businesses sales revenue. The city uses 1% of the 2% of sales tax revenue for general operations of the city, .5% for Pharr Economic Development Corporation operations and uses the remaining .5% in lieu of property tax in order to keep rates low. For the fiscal year 18-19 total sales tax collected was \$21,014,179 an increase of \$2,379,454 compared to last year. The main reason for the growth can be attributed to new and more businesses opening in Pharr such as restaurants, Top Golf and retail stores. Below is a graph that compares this year to last years monthly sales tax revenues.




CURRENT YEAR ANALYSIS

At the start of this fiscal year revenues were off to a slow start and began to pick up at the end of the second quarter of the year. In the chart below the steadily low revenues cane be seen from October thru March and then a quick uptake in the final 6 months. The revenues are expected to remain constant at this point.



YEAR TO YEAR ANALYSIS



BRIDGE REVENUES


CURRENT YEAR ANALYSIS

This fiscal year bridge earned its most revenues in the month of January with a total of \$1,294,125. The biggest increase in revenues was \$172,300, which took place between December and January. The largest decrease, \$233,042, was between March and April. The chart below shows a relatively positive trend that is expected to continue next year. With revenues decreasing in early winter and picking back up in late winter through late spring.



YEAR TO YEAR ANALYSIS

The Pharr International bridge again had a good year. It generated \$14.0 million this fiscal year in crossing revenues, showing an increase of \$30k in comparison to last year. Despite the decrease in value of the peso and the new Anzalduas bridge opening and all border situation the Pharr bridge has continued to generate increases in revenues without any indication of slowing down.
